- <sup>1</sup> Courses that meet the CATC Thematic Core tags (a maximum of 3 tags can meet both Thematic Core and major requirements): ART 251 (GP, HP), ART 351 (DUS, VPAV) ART 352 (HP, VPAV) ART 353 (HP, VPAV)
- <sup>2</sup> Fulfilling CORE Bible requirements with ARCH 211 or ARCH 213 is required for regular Art History majors (a necessary prerequisite to ART 345/ARCH 345), though this is recommended for alternate Art History majors as well.
- <sup>3</sup> Not required for Alternate Art History students.
- <sup>4</sup> 10 hours of supporting credits are required for a regular Art History Major and 16 credits an alternate Art History Major. See catalog or faculty advisor for more information. The well-trodden path of double major in Philosophy and Art History requires that supporting classes include PHIL 243, 245, 311, 312, 454 or 455, and 494.
- There are two Art History Major tracks, the difference being the inclusion of Archaeology. The Alternate Program of Study (without Archaeology) enables more flexibility to supplement Art History with work in other departments or beyond Wheaton. It is especially useful for students seeking to double major, as supporting courses applied to an Art History major can count towards different majors as well. The criteria for identifying supporting classes are anything that fortifies knowledge of Art History (History of Philosophy, Literature, History, Anatomy, Study Abroad courses, Wheaton in Chicago courses, etc.).
- -A reading knowledge of two foreign languages is recommended for students who anticipate graduate study.
