CHAPTER ONE

When Sisters Move Too Soon: Learning to Wait on God

Genesis 30:14-24

When Wanting Becomes a Problem

Have you ever wanted something so bad that you were willing to do anything to get it? Maybe you prayed for it, tried to work things out on your own, or even made some questionable choices to make it happen. If so, then you understand exactly where Rachel and Leah found themselves in this story. These two sisters let their desires get the best of them, and in the process, they manipulated, bargained, and even used the people around them to get what they wanted. Sound familiar?

This story is a reminder that when we try to move ahead of God, things can get messy. But it also shows us that God is faithful, even when we aren't. Let's take a closer look at what happens when sisters move too soon and what we can learn from their mistakes.

1. A Sister's Appetite: When Desire Controls You

(Genesis 30:14)

Reuben, Leah's son, finds some mandrakes—a plant believed to help with fertility—and brings them to his mother. Rachel sees them and immediately begs Leah for some. Why? Because she desperately wants a child and believes these little plants might be the answer to her problem.

Rachel's appetite for a child is so strong that she is willing to bargain with Leah, offering her a night with Jacob in exchange for the

mandrakes. Instead of waiting on God, she's trying to take matters into her own hands. How often do we do the same thing? When we don't trust God's timing, we reach for quick fixes, hoping they'll satisfy us. But they never do.

Lesson: God—not a person, a thing, or a shortcut—is the source of all blessings. When we chase after something more than we chase after Him, we're bound to be disappointed.

2. A Sister's Attitude: When Jealousy Takes Over

(Genesis 30:15)

Leah doesn't just hand over the mandrakes. She snaps back at Rachel, reminding her that she already took her husband. Now she wants her son's mandrakes too? Leah is still holding onto past wounds and using this opportunity to strike back.

Rachel, on the other hand, is so focused on getting what she wants that she's willing to trade her husband's affection for it. She treats Jacob like a pawn, controlling him instead of trusting God to move in her situation.

This is what happens when our attitudes are ruled by jealousy, insecurity, or competition. We become manipulative, bitter, and blind to what we already have. Leah had children but wanted Jacob's love. Rachel had Jacob's love but wanted children. Neither was content.

Lesson: Jealousy blinds us to the blessings we already have. Instead of comparing ourselves to others, we should trust that God has a unique plan for each of us.

3. A Sister's Affection: When We Misplace Our Trust

(Genesis 30:16-21)

Leah "buys" a night with Jacob using the mandrakes. That night, she conceives again. She gives birth to two more sons and a daughter. She sees this as a reward from God, but the truth is, she never needed to trade anything for a blessing. God was already looking out for her.

Too often, we act like Leah. We think we have to "earn" God's blessings by making deals, working harder, or even trying to manipulate situations. But God's goodness isn't something we have to hustle for—it's something He freely gives.

Lesson: God's blessings don't come through manipulation. He already has a plan, and we just need to trust Him.

4. A Sister's Adoration: When We Finally See God Move

(Genesis 30:22-24)

After all the scheming, all the bargaining, and all the heartbreak, God finally moves in Rachel's life. He remembers her, hears her prayers, and gives her a son—Joseph. And for the first time, Rachel acknowledges God's work in her life, saying, "God has removed my disgrace."

Rachel could have saved herself so much pain if she had trusted God from the beginning. But even though she got ahead of Him, He still showed her grace. That's the beauty of our God—He doesn't hold our mistakes against us. He is patient, loving, and always working behind the scenes for our good.

Lesson: God never forgets us. His timing may not match ours, but His plan is always perfect.

Five Best Praxis Ideas for Learning to Wait on God

- Pray First, Act Second Before making any major decision, take time to pray and seek God's direction. Don't let your emotions rush you into something outside of His will.
- Avoid Comparison Traps Your blessings won't look like someone else's. Stay focused on what God is doing in your life instead of competing with others.
- Recognize When You're Manipulating Be honest with yourself. Are you trying to "help" God by controlling people or circumstances? If so, step back and trust Him.
- Be Content in Every Season Instead of fixating on what you don't have, practice gratitude for what you do have. Contentment keeps your heart aligned with God.
- Remember That God's Timing Is Perfect Delays are not denials. If you're waiting on something, know that God is still working, even when you don't see it.

Final Thoughts

Leah and Rachel's story is a powerful reminder that when we move ahead of God, we create unnecessary drama, pain, and frustration. But even in our impatience, God remains faithful. He sees us, hears us, and has a plan that is always better than anything we could come up with on our own.

So, if you're in a season of waiting, take heart. God hasn't forgotten you. Trust Him, be patient, and rest in the knowledge that what He has for you is already on its way.

When word got back to David, his warrior instincts kicked in. He strapped on his sword and told his men, "Let's ride." Four hundred men mounted up, ready to wipe out every male in Nabal's house. It was about to be a massacre.

But here's where true leadership steps in. A servant who overheard the exchange ran to Lady Abigail. He knew she was the only one with enough sense to defuse this crisis. "My lady," he said, "David sent men to ask for help, and our master insulted them. But David's men have been nothing but good to us. Now, trouble is coming, and only you can stop it."

Abigail didn't waste time. Leadership in crisis means moving fast, thinking clear, and acting wisely. She gathered bread, wine, roasted grain, raisins, and figs—everything needed to turn away wrath—and set out to meet David before he could reach their home. And when she saw him, she didn't approach with arrogance or fear; she bowed low and spoke with wisdom.

"My lord," she said, "let me speak. Don't let this fool steal your peace. Don't let anger push you to do something you'll regret. When David heard that Nabal was gone, he didn't waste time. He knew a woman like Abigail was rare. He sent for her, and she became his wife. Abigail had not only saved her household—she had secured her future.

What do we learn from Abigail? Leadership in tough times isn't about flexing power—it's about using wisdom, discernment, and knowing when to step up. She didn't wait for permission to lead; she saw a crisis and moved. She was bold but humble, strong but wise. And because of her, disaster was avoided, and God's will prevailed. That, my friends, is leadership in action.

And yet, in her lowest moment, she discovered the power of a God who is more than enough.

A Desperate Cry for Help

This woman had lost her husband, a man who had faithfully served the Lord. Now, with creditors knocking on her door, threatening to take her sons as slaves, she did what every wise woman of faith must do—she ran to the man of God.

She didn't suffer in silence. She didn't pretend everything was fine. She cried out for help. And let me tell you something: God hears the cries of His daughters! When we bring our brokenness to Him, He does not ignore us. He responds!

What Do You Have?

Elisha's response wasn't to hand her a bag of money. No, he asked her, *"What do you have in your house?"* At first, she thought she had nothing. But then she remembered—she had a little jar of oil.

Sometimes we focus so much on what we've lost that we forget what we still have. God will often use the very thing you think is insignificant to bring about your breakthrough. You may feel like you have nothing left, but God is saying, "*I have already placed in you everything you need to walk in victory.*"

A Faith That Borrows Jars

Elisha instructed the widow to borrow as many empty jars as she could and start pouring her oil into them. Now, this command didn't make much sense. How could a small jar of oil fill multiple containers? But faith doesn't always make sense—faith requires action.

This woman had to move beyond her fear and do something bold. She had to step out in faith, knocking on doors, gathering jars, and believing that somehow, some way, God was going to provide. And He did! The oil kept flowing until every jar was full.

The Power of Private Miracles

Elisha told her to shut the door before she started pouring. Why? Because some miracles aren't meant for public display. There are seasons where God does His best work behind closed doors. In your ministry, in your life, don't be discouraged if God is working in silence. What He is doing in the secret place will soon overflow into the public place!

Living in the Overflow

When the pouring finally stopped, the widow had more than enough. She was able to pay off her debts and live on what remained. That's the kind of God we serve! He's not just a "get-you-by" God—He's a God of *overflow*!

Sisters, when ministry is tough, when the burden is heavy, when you feel like you're running on empty—remember this: God is the source of your strength. He will take what little you have and multiply it beyond what you could ever imagine. Keep the faith, keep trusting, and keep pouring. The oil will keep flowing as long as there's a vessel ready to receive it!

Best Praxis for Women in Difficult Ministry

Cry Out to God – Never hesitate to bring your struggles before the Lord. He hears you and will respond.

Recognize What You Have – Don't discount the gifts, resources, and anointing God has already placed in your hands.

Step Out in Faith – Even when the instructions don't make sense, trust God and move forward.

Shut the Door and Seek God – Not every season is for public display. Some miracles happen in the secret place.

Live in the Overflow – Expect God to do exceedingly, abundantly above all you can ask or think.

CHAPTER SIX

Esther's Bold Faith: A Call to Courage for Women Leaders

Esther 4:7-16

Sister, let's talk. Have you ever felt like you were in a place where God was calling you to step up, but fear was whispering, "Stay quiet"? Have you ever wondered if you were the right person for the job, questioning whether you had the strength, the influence, or the courage to lead? If so, you're in good company—because that's exactly where Esther found herself.

Esther hesitated at first. And let's be honest—wouldn't you? Going before the king uninvited could mean death. But Mordecai didn't let her off the hook. He reminded her:

"Who knows whether you have come to the kingdom for such a time as this?" (v. 14)

Sister, let me ask you: What if God put you exactly where you are because He needs you there? That position you hold? That ministry you lead? That community you serve? God placed you there on purpose. Esther had every reason to be afraid, but she had an even greater reason to trust. And so do you.

If you've ever doubted whether you're the right person for the job, hear this loud and clear: God does not call the equipped; He equips the called. And sister, He has called YOU.

5 Best Praxis Lessons for Women Needing Courage

Even in your suffering, God has a plan for your future. The challenges you face today don't define your tomorrow. Trust in God's promises for your leadership journey, no matter how impossible they may seem. **Create Your Own "Beer Lahai Roi"** After God spoke to her, Hagar named the place "Beer Lahai Roi," meaning "The Well of the Living One Who Sees Me." When God meets us in our struggles, He often gives us a place to remember His faithfulness. Create a "memory stone" in your leadership—whether it's through journaling, prayer, or creating a tradition that helps you remember how God has seen you and been faithful. These "places" help us re-center when life feels chaotic.

Empower Others with Your Story After receiving God's grace, Hagar didn't keep it to herself. She went back and gave birth to her son, Ishmael. Your leadership journey, no matter how hard, is a testimony of God's grace. Share it. Let other women see that they, too, are not alone. The power of your testimony can break chains and lift others who are suffering. Be a beacon of hope by sharing the ways God has moved in your life.

Conclusion

Like Hagar, women in leadership can find themselves in the wilderness—unseen, misunderstood, and mistreated. But just like Hagar, you are not forgotten. God sees you. He hears your cries, and He is with you, even when it feels like you are facing it all alone.

Sometimes, it's the weight of our problems that pushes us toward Jesus. When life gets heavy, when we're at the end of our rope, that's when we realize there's no one else to turn to but Him.

II. The Woman's Position (Mark 7:26a)

Now, let's talk about the woman's position. She's a Greek woman from the region of Syro-Phoenicia—an outsider. She's not part of the Jewish community. She didn't have the law of Moses, nor the prophets. She was from a people who worshiped foreign gods.

She was an outsider in every sense—culturally, religiously, and socially. Maybe some of you can relate. Maybe you've felt like you didn't belong, like you weren't good enough, like you were on the outside looking in. But here's the good news: faith doesn't care about your background or your status. Faith doesn't care about what others say or where you're from. Faith in God brings you into His presence.

This woman had no earthly resources. She was alone, and yet, she believed that Jesus could do something that no one else could. That's what faith looks like—it shows up when everything else says, "You don't belong here."

III. The Woman's Plea (Mark 7:26b-28)

Now we come to her plea. This woman wasn't just asking Jesus once she kept on asking. The Bible says she kept begging Him to cast the demon out of her daughter. She was desperate. A mother in crisis, standing in the gap for her child.

This, my friends, is intercessory prayer. Intercession is when you pray on behalf of someone else, standing in the gap for them when they can't stand for themselves. This woman's prayer wasn't cute or quiet; it was a bold, raw, desperate plea for her child's life.

Sometimes, that's what our prayers need to sound like—raw, real, and unfiltered. Sometimes we need to stop worrying about how we look or what others think. We need to fall at Jesus' feet and say, "Lord, help me!"

Her plea was so powerful that even though Jesus initially tested her faith by saying it wasn't yet time to give to the Gentiles, she didn't get offended. She didn't walk away. Instead, she responded, "Yes, Lord, even the dogs under the table eat the children's crumbs."

Here's the thing: She understood that even the smallest portion of Jesus' grace was enough to change her life. She didn't need the whole loaf—just a crumb. Because what's in the loaf is in the crumbs.

Best Practices for Praying for Others

As we reflect on this woman's story, let me give you five best practices to remember when praying for others:

- Be Persistent: Don't give up when the answer doesn't come immediately. Keep praying, even when it feels like nothing is happening. This woman kept asking. Your persistence in prayer shows the depth of your faith.
- Pray Boldly: Pray with confidence, knowing that God hears you and has the power to act. Don't be afraid to ask for big things, even when you feel unworthy. God delights in hearing the cries of His children.
- Pray for the Impossible: Just like this woman was praying for a miracle, pray for things that seem impossible. If God can heal a daughter possessed by a demon, He can certainly handle whatever situation you're facing.
- 4. **Pray with Humility:** Recognize that we don't deserve God's grace, but we can still ask for it. Just like this woman, come before Him humbly, acknowledging His sovereignty and grace.
- 5. **Pray in Faith:** Believe that God can and will move. This woman believed that even a crumb from Jesus' table would be enough, and her faith was rewarded.

Conclusion

As we close today, let me remind you: Even if you feel like all you have are crumbs, Jesus can do a miracle with that. Just like this woman, we can trust that the leftovers of God's grace are enough to heal, restore, and deliver. Jesus is the Bread of Life. His broken body on the cross opened the door for us all. The crumbs we receive from Him carry all the power of salvation, healing, and grace.

So if you feel like you're only worthy of the crumbs, know this: Those crumbs carry everything you need. And if you're standing in the gap for someone else, don't hesitate to pray, knowing that Jesus will respond to your faith.

Whatever you need—whether it's a crumb or the whole loaf—Jesus has enough to meet your every need. Come to the table, fall at His feet, and trust that His grace is sufficient for you.

CHAPTER TEN

The Hidden Hero: Honoring Moses' Mama

Exodus 2:1-10

As I reflect on the story of Moses' mother, I am reminded of the incredible strength and faith that mothers have, especially when it feels like the world is working against them. Moses' Mama Had an Assessment

- Protect Your Children Don't expose them to the harmful things of this world. Shield them from negative influences, and guide them toward the truth of God's Word.
- Walk by Faith Sometimes, you won't know the outcome, but faith is about trusting God with what you can't see. Just like Moses' mother, you can rest in the assurance that God will take care of your children.
- Trust in Divine Intervention God can use anyone, even your enemies, to fulfill His purpose for your children. Trust that He will provide, protect, and guide them, even when you can't be there.
- Let Go and Let God There comes a time when you must trust God enough to let go. Let your children go into God's hands, knowing that He is the ultimate protector and provider.

I want to encourage you, woman of God, to be like Moses' mama. Be a woman who trusts God with everything, especially with your children. God has a plan for their lives, and He has a plan for yours too. Keep the faith, and watch how He works miracles in your life and in the lives of those you love.

CHAPTER ELEVEN

The Miracle of Nain: Don't Give Up, It Ain't Over Yet Luke 7:11-17

As I reflect on the miracle of Nain, I'm reminded of how often life can feel like a funeral procession. The weight of loss, the sorrow of setbacks, the feeling of being stuck in a painful cycle. And yet, in those moments, Jesus shows up. Not in the way we expect, not with a grand entrance, but with compassion and power to change everything.

I've learned that sometimes the hardest seasons are the very places where we encounter the greatest miracles. This widow in Nain was carrying a dead son, the only one she had left. And it's in this space of absolute devastation that Jesus enters. He's about to change everything, and he's about to show us something profound: it ain't over until God says it is.

1. Embrace the Encounter with Jesus

Jesus didn't just pass by the widow; He saw her. When Jesus sees us, He doesn't just glance in our direction. He takes notice of our pain, our grief, our struggles. They were a declaration that **life is more powerful than death**. His word still has the power to shift situations, heal wounds, and resurrect dreams. In the midst of your struggles, pause to hear the voice of God. **Get still enough to listen**, because His word brings life to dead places.

4. Align Your Faith with His Power

When Jesus speaks, it demands a response. For the widow, the miracle came when she received His word. For the young man, life came when he responded to the call. Faith isn't just believing something could happen; it's responding to God's call. Jesus doesn't ask us to stay in despair. He asks us to respond with faith. **Take action on His word**.

Your faith is the catalyst for transformation. Whatever God is speaking over you, trust that He has the power to bring it to fruition.

5. Remember That God Has the Last Word

Death may have had the first word, but Jesus had the last. The crowd saw a dead man being carried out; Jesus saw a man who would rise again. The widow thought her journey had ended, but Jesus wasn't finished with her story. **It ain't over yet**. Whatever challenge you're facing, no matter how final it may feel, remember that Jesus has the last word. **He is the resurrection and the life**, and in His timing, He will make all things new. So, **hold on to His promises**, because they are sure, and they are faithful.

Closing Reflection: The Transformation of Nain

The city of Nain was known for its beauty, but after Jesus' miracle, it became a place of wonder. The people glorified God, saying, **"A great prophet has risen among us."** And the report of this miracle spread everywhere. When Jesus shows up, He transforms everything—our pain, our grief, our limitations—into a testimony of His power. Just as He changed Nain that day, He can change your life today.

So, my friend, whatever you're going through, **don't give up**. It ain't over yet. Jesus is with you, and He's got the power to turn your sorrow into joy, your mourning into dancing, your loss into restoration. Keep holding on, because your miracle is closer than you think.

In the midst of your darkest moments, trust that God is at work. You are seen, you are loved, and it's not over until He says it is.

CHAPTER TWELVE:

"God Came Through: A Miracle for Mama"

1 Kings 17

There are moments in life when we can't help but be amazed at how God shows up, especially for mothers who carry the weight of the world on their shoulders. I think back to my own mama—oh, what a woman of faith. Her life was a testament to what it means to trust God even when the situation didn't make sense. If it weren't for her example, I don't know if I would have the kind of faith I have today.

Zarephath means "refining," and that's exactly what God was doing—not only in Elijah's life but in the widow's life as well. God was refining them both.

I can't tell you how many times God has led me into situations that felt like a place of refining—where the resources were few, the struggles were many, and all I had left was faith. And in those moments, God has shown up in ways I never expected. The miracle didn't come until I showed up at the place He called me to be.

A New Ministry Level: Stepping Out in Faith

Elijah's faith is put to the test when he arrives at Zarephath. He sees the widow gathering sticks and asks her for a little water, which she agrees to give. Then, he takes it a step further and asks for a piece of bread. This was a bold request. The woman had no bread to give. She had just enough flour and oil to make one final meal before she and her son would die.

Here's where it gets interesting: God asks us to do things that don't make sense in the natural. He calls us to give when we feel like we don't have anything left to give. He asks us to trust Him when the

circumstances scream "it's over." But this is where the miracle happens. This is where God does what only He can do.

The widow could have said no. She could have refused, thinking, *How* am I supposed to give to someone else when I'm barely making it myself? But instead, she obeyed. And in that moment of faith, God opened the door for her miracle.

A New Ministry Look: Obeying God's Word in the Midst of Crisis

Elijah's prophetic words to the widow were simple: "Go, make me a small cake first, and bring it to me. And afterward, make some for yourself and your son. For thus says the Lord: 'The bin of flour shall not be used up, nor shall the jar of oil run dry until the day the Lord sends rain on the earth.""

Do you know what that means? It means that when you obey God, even when it doesn't make sense, He will provide for you in ways you could never imagine. The widow was in the middle of a crisis, but her faith led to a miracle. Her obedience unlocked God's provision. The flour and oil didn't run out; she and her son ate for many days.

Sometimes, I get scared too. Sometimes, I wonder how things are going to work out. But I've learned that **God can do more with our little than we ever could on our own.** If we're willing to put Him first—even when it seems impossible—He will provide for us in ways that defy logic.

5 Best Praxis for Trusting God's Miracles in Your Life:

- Obey God's Word, Even When It Doesn't Make Sense: Like the widow, there will be times when you feel like you don't have anything left to give. But when God calls you to obey, do it! Your obedience will unlock His provision.
- 2. **Trust God's Timing:** The widow didn't know when the miracle would come. But she trusted God, and He provided just what she needed at the right time. Trust that God knows the right moment to show up.
- 3. Serve Others First: The widow was asked to put Elijah's needs before her own. Sometimes, we have to step out and serve others—even when we're in need ourselves. It's in serving others that God shows up for us.
- 4. Live in Faith, Not Fear: The widow's first response was fear. Elijah had to tell her not to fear. Don't let fear hold you back from stepping into what God has for you. Trust Him to provide.
- 5. Expect Miracles in the Most Unlikely Places: Sometimes, God calls us to places that seem barren and hopeless. But that's exactly where He wants to show His power. Watch for His miracles, especially when everything around you looks impossible.

Mothers, just like the widow of Zarephath, God is ready to show up and show out on your behalf. All it takes is faith and obedience. God came through for her, and He'll come through for you too. Hold on, because your miracle is on the way.

CHAPTER THIRTEEN

Don't Look Back: The Warning of Lot's Wife *Remember Lot's Wife*

Luke 17:32

Let's take a moment to talk about a woman in Scripture who, at first glance, might seem insignificant but carries a weighty lesson for us all. I'm talking about Lot's wife—yes, the one who turned into a pillar of salt. She doesn't have a name, doesn't say a word, and doesn't appear to be anything more than a fleeting character in the biblical narrative. But in reality, she's a cautionary tale that still speaks to us today.

You see, Lot's wife never gets much attention. We don't know her family history, what she looked like, or much about her personality. We don't even get a glimpse into her inner world—her hopes, her dreams, her struggles. But here's the kicker: Jesus, the Savior Himself, tells us to remember her. And when the Savior says "remember," you better pay attention.

When we take a closer look at Lot's wife, we discover that the one thing she left behind, the one thing that marked her life, was a tragic moment of disobedience to God. She is a symbol of human rebellion, of clinging to the things of this world and turning away from salvation when it's within reach.

The Tragedy of Unbelief

Let's think about her for a moment. Lot's wife had an opportunity to escape. The angels had come to warn her, urging her to flee the impending destruction of Sodom. They gave her clear instructions: "Don't look back." The city of Sodom was about to be destroyed because of its wickedness, but God, in His mercy, had sent a way of escape.

But when she had the chance to follow God's command, Lot's wife hesitated. She couldn't let go of Sodom—the city she had called home, the city that had given her everything she thought she wanted. Sodom was her comfort zone, her identity, her place of security. The destruction of that place felt like losing herself.

When she turned around to look back, she was not just looking at a city being destroyed. She was looking at the part of herself she was unwilling to leave behind. Her heart was still in Sodom. Her longing for the past, her desire to hold onto her life as it was, blinded her to the urgency of God's call.

And in that moment, her unbelief—her refusal to trust God's plan, His salvation, and His timing—became her undoing. The result of her disobedience was immediate: she became a pillar of salt, frozen in time as a warning for all who would hear it.

Lessons from Lot's Wife:

Let me ask you: Have you ever found yourself standing between the life God has for you and the life you've built for yourself? Are you holding onto things, relationships, or dreams that God is calling you to leave behind? Lot's wife serves as a mirror to us all. Her story isn't just about looking back physically—it's about the heart. She represents the danger of letting your affection for the world override your obedience to God. It's so easy to fall into the trap of believing that our plans, our desires, and our comforts are more important than following God's Word. But remember this: the things you hold onto too tightly may be the very things that keep you from the life God has for you. When we look back, we're choosing to stay in the past rather than moving forward with faith.

The Woman's Affection for Sodom:

When the angels told Lot's family to flee, they gave them a command: *Don't look back*. But Lot's wife didn't obey. Why? Because she had an affection for Sodom. She loved the city, the lifestyle, the comforts. Sodom had become her identity. The pleasures of sin, the thrills, the status—she was in love with it all.

You see, there's a danger in holding onto what the world offers. When God tells us to move on, we must move on. We cannot cling to sin or worldly pleasures just because they feel good in the moment. If God says leave it behind, then it's time to go. Lot's wife teaches us that there's nothing worth looking back at when God is calling us to move forward.

The Woman's Affinity with Sodom:

Lot's wife didn't just love the city; she had an affinity for it. She had become one with it. Her kinship with the people of Sodom made it harder for her to obey God's command to leave. She was tied to the culture, the people, the way of life. And because of that, when it was time to escape, she couldn't bring herself to let go. She had too much of herself invested in that city. Let this serve as a warning to us. We must not allow ourselves to become so intertwined with the world's culture that we can't hear God's call to leave it behind. There's nothing wrong with enjoying life, but when our identity and security become tied to the world's standards and ways, we've drifted too far. Lot's wife's fate is a reminder that when we make the world our home, we lose sight of the true Home that God is preparing for us.

The Woman's Annihilation Because of Sodom:

Lot's wife's destruction was the result of her unbelief. She didn't trust that God would do what He said He would do. She thought she could escape the wrath and still hold on to what was familiar. But disobedience to God's Word leads to destruction. When we fail to trust God fully, when we refuse to let go of what's behind, we risk our spiritual wellbeing. She could have been saved, but her hesitation, her refusal to obey, led to her annihilation.

Conclusion:

Lot's wife serves as a reminder that we must not look back. There's nothing in this world worth turning around for. God is calling us to move forward, to follow His Word, to trust in His salvation. Our obedience to God is not just for our benefit; it's for His glory. We don't have to suffer the same fate as Lot's wife if we choose to trust in His promises and keep our eyes fixed on Jesus.

Five Best Praxis Ideas:

- 1. Evaluate Your Attachments: Reflect on the things or people you are holding onto too tightly. Ask yourself: Is there anything in my life that I'm unwilling to let go of, even if God is calling me to move forward?
- Commit to Obedience: Make a conscious decision to obey God's instructions, no matter how difficult it might seem. Trust that His plan for your life is better than anything the world can offer.
- Guard Your Heart: Be careful about where your affections lie. The things of this world can easily distract you from your purpose. Regularly check your heart and priorities.
- Keep Your Eyes on the Prize: Don't get distracted by past mistakes or present temptations. Focus on the hope and future God has for you. Press forward, not backward.
- 5. Encourage Others to Move Forward: Be a voice of encouragement for others who are struggling to let go of their past. Remind them of the hope that lies ahead when we trust God completely.

Remember Lot's wife. Don't look back. Keep moving forward in faith, because there's nothing in this world worth returning to.

CHAPTER FOURTEEN

A Worship-Filled Home: Creating a Godly Atmosphere John 12:1-10 (NKJV)

I believe the true heartbeat of a worship-filled home is centered in how we serve, how we give, and how we reflect Christ in our daily lives. Today, I want to share the importance of creating a godly atmosphere one where Christ is at the center of everything we do. When I read this passage from John 12, I can't help but be amazed by the profound example set by Mary, Martha, and Lazarus. They show us that worship is not just about what we do on Sundays, but about our whole life—how we serve, how we give, and how we witness Christ to those around us.

A worship-filled home starts with having a heart for worship. When our hearts are full of gratitude and love for Christ, it overflows into every aspect of our lives. Then there's Mary. Mary's act of worship is deeply personal. She gives something priceless—her alabaster jar of spikenard, which was worth an entire year's wages. She breaks the jar and pours it out on Jesus' feet, wiping them with her hair. This is not a casual act of worship. It's a sacrifice. It's costly. It's deeply intimate.

I think about how Mary's worship speaks to me on so many levels. She didn't just give the Lord a little. She gave Him her best. How often do I hold back from offering God my best because I'm worried about what others think? Worship, like Mary's, isn't about public approval; it's about giving Christ the best of what we have, no matter the cost.

This brings me to the heart of worship: **sacrifice**. True worship isn't comfortable. It doesn't always make sense. But it's always worth it. Jesus said, "For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also" (Matthew 6:21). Mary's heart was fully devoted to Christ, and it showed in her sacrificial act of worship.

A Heart for Worship: Lazarus' Witness

Lazarus is a powerful reminder of the witness our lives can be. Lazarus didn't have to say a word. His very presence at the table was a testimony

to the power of Jesus. People came from all around to see Lazarus, the man who had been dead and was now alive. His life was a walking, breathing sermon on the resurrection power of Christ.

Our worship, too, is a witness to the world. When people see how we live, how we serve, and how we love Christ, it draws them closer to Him. Our lives should be filled with the fragrance of Christ, just like the house was filled with the fragrance of the oil Mary poured out. We are called to be living testimonies of God's goodness, mercy, and grace.

A Heart for Worship: Judas' Contempt

It's also important to recognize the presence of Judas in this story. Judas' words and actions stand in stark contrast to Mary's worship. He criticizes her, accusing her of wasting the oil that could have been sold to help the poor. His problem, however, wasn't a concern for the poor it was that he didn't understand the value of worship.

Here's the thing: Whenever we choose to worship with all our heart, there will always be people who don't understand. They'll criticize, mock, or question why we worship the way we do. But remember, their criticism is often a reflection of their own heart, not yours. Don't let anyone stop you from giving your best to the Lord.

A Heart for Worship: Jesus' Response

What I love about this passage is Jesus' response. When Judas questions Mary's actions, Jesus defends her. He says, "Let her alone; she has done a good work for Me" (verse 7). Jesus sees the heart behind the act. He understands the sacrifice. He honors her worship.

When we worship with a pure heart, God sees that, and He honors it. Even if no one else notices, Jesus sees our worship. That's what matters most.

Conclusion: A Worship-Filled Home

A worship-filled home is a home where Christ is the center of everything. It's a place where we serve Him with our best, where we give sacrificially, and where our lives become a witness to the world around us. And while others may not always understand or appreciate it, we can rest assured that God honors every act of worship done in His name.

Let's make our homes places of worship—not just in song, but in service, sacrifice, and witness. Let our homes be filled with the fragrance of worship, just like the house in Bethany was filled with the fragrance of Mary's oil. When we do, we will see the power of God move in ways we never imagined.
